Note from Fr. Bill and Fr. Peter to all parents of St. Mary Magdalene Parish regarding Faith Formation/Religious Education:

Hi Parents of the Children and Youth in our Religious Education/Faith Formation programs at St. Mary Magdalene Parish,

Greetings! We trust that your summer has been a good one, even with (or maybe even because of), the challenges that the Pandemic has brought us.

We know you are wondering what will be offered in regards to the Faith Formation/Religious Education for our children. The following comes from conversations with the coordinators at all three Church Sites and the Faith Formation Committee at St. Dunstan's Site:

1. We will wait until October to implement a plan for religious education for children and youth. Parents will be necessarily occupied through September with getting their children back to school and the many demands this requires during the pandemic. This also gives us as a parish, time to evaluate how things are going within the school system before we venture forward with any in-person aspect of the religious education program.
2. We have not yet opened our Church sites, except for Sunday/Weekend Masses and our office is open for employees. Others can access the office by appointment. We will not open our Parish Centers (Halls) until we feel we can safely do so, and with proper protocols. We will continue to evaluate this. However, for this year (October through May), we will offer options for parents to tend to the religious formation of your children at home. We are presently working on options that will allow you to have 10 to 20 sessions of approximately 30 to 45 minutes each. You all have different circumstances to consider as you provide this for your children. It is important that you are able to offer something and the amount of time and energy you can realistically give to this depends on many factors that are particular to each of you. Just do what you can and God will be able to do great things with you and your children.
3. For the Youth (Grades 7-9), we will be offering something on-line in conjunction with other parishes. This will not require the parents to lead or facilitate.

4. Once we open our Parish Centers (Halls) for gatherings, we will consider safe ways for families of our Religious Education Program to gather periodically as a support to what they are doing at home.
5. For those who were to celebrate First Communion and/or Confirmation this past April/May, we will be in touch soon to offer you possibilities for this to happen in the Fall.
6. We will be in touch in mid to late September with Options for 'at-home' sessions and a registration form.

Scripture Quotes that bring hope and encouragement:

Our Sacred Stories: God and Us
Sacred Spaces: Finding Our Spiritual Centre
(Fr. John Jennings)

Took a hike, recently through some of the trails of Mactaquac Provincial Park. The trails wind through forests and around beaver ponds. The forests in the fall are a collage of green, and yellow and red. The ponds are places showing the work of the beavers, the energy of the squirrels and presence of deer and moose. The ponds and the forests are filled with a host of different birds. Over it all there is a wonderful sense of calm and peace. This is, indeed, a sacred space. Walking through it one can sense the presence of the Spirit.

We have a long history of finding such sites as places where we experience the presence of God among us. The Ancients, Celts found this in springs, wells and other water sources. These were the places where life was supported for them, signs of the divine presence for them. Here they knew that God touches their human experience in real ways.

In our Scriptures the image of sacred spaces appears frequently. In the New Testament we see it in Matthew's Gospel, 21:33-46, where Jesus employs the image of a vineyard for his message of God's reign among us. This image is an echo of what we can find in the Old Testament. In Psalm 80, it represents the whole People of God. In the Prophet Isaiah (5:1-7), God's People are the object of a love song. For Isaiah, for the psalm and for Matthew, "the vineyard" is the place where we center on God.

Wade Davis is a Canadian anthropologist. He holds the position of Explorer-in-Residence for National Geographic. In November 2009, he delivered the CBC Massey Lectures as part of the *Ideas* programs on CBC. The series was entitled *The Wayfinders: Why Ancient Wisdom Matters in the Modern World*. One of the lectures was "Sacred Geography."

Davis' lecture focused on a number of places around the world, northern B.C., the Andes in South America and the desert of central Australia. There he found places which over the centuries have been deemed sacred by the indigenous peoples who live there. They are places which long have been seen as sources of life for them.

We still need these spaces to bring meaning to our own lives. We have many personal ones.

They may include a room in our home where we tend to go to be at peace. The site may be our local church or a community gathering place. Sometimes there is a particular place or path in the woods where we enjoy a sense of "getting it all together". Whether we realize it or not, we all have our sacred spaces. And we need them.

Often, we do not recognize that everyone of us has a "natural spirituality". Whoever we are and wherever we are we have a spiritual centre. There we discover something that offers peace and brings meaning to our lives. Such spirituality is life-giving to every human being on earth. Fr. Richard Rohr noticed this in the writings of an English Benedictine monk, Bede Griffiths.

Rohr quotes Bede's insight: "According to the Letter to the Colossians, in Christ 'all things were created, in heaven and on earth... all were created through him and for him' [Col. 1:16]. This is truly a cosmic vision embracing the whole created world, which we now know to be an integrated whole,... which is capable of embracing all humanity."(from: Rohr. Reflections 25 Sept 2020)

**Where do I find my sacred spaces? How do I
nurture my own spiritual life?**

Note from Fr. Bill: Some are asking how the new Provincial Government regulation that allows for people to have one-meter distancing as long as we are wearing a mask will affect our protocols in the parish for attending Mass. Presently we are able to accommodate everyone that is attending by using the 2-meter social distancing and so we will continue to do that as an additional precaution for safety.

However, as our gatherings increase in number and because we wear masks throughout the Mass, we have an option to revisit our seating arrangements at each site and will do so as is necessary with the numbers who are attending. I will keep you informed as changes are made. For now, we will be maintaining the two-meter distancing until I inform you of a change. However, it does allow us more freedom in people needing to leave their seat to use the bathroom facilities. You will be able to use bathroom facilities at any time because we are maintaining the wearing of masks for everyone throughout the Mass except for those under 2 years of age and those with medical conditions preventing them from using a mask. We will continue the use of masks throughout the full Mass because we are not always able to keep the 2-meter distancing for seating people and movement that is necessary during the Mass for such things as bathroom use. Please see the Bulletin below regarding our protocols when attending church services.

1. We need to have the name and phone number of every person who attends as 'follow up' information should an incident happen.

- You are free to choose the Mass you desire to attend.

-We will keep the lists we have for St. Columba and Sts John and Paul Site and your name will be checked as you enter the church and are screened. If you are not on the list, just come to Mass and your name and phone number will be added.

-For St. Dunstan's Site, you will be asked to fill out an information sheet with your name (and each family member's name who is attending with you) and a contact phone number. You will be asked to place it in a box when you arrive. It will be helpful if you fill this information out before you come to Mass and bring it with you. The sheet is attached.

2. You will be asked the following screening questions.

- Do you have any of the following symptoms: fever/feverish, cough, sore throat, head ache, runny nose, a new cough or worsening chronic cough, new onset of fatigue, diarrhea, loss of taste or smell; in children, purple marking on the fingers and toes?
- Have you had close contact within the last 14 days with a confirmed case of Covid-19?
- Have you been diagnosed with Covid-19?
- Have you returned from travel outside of Atlantic Canada within the last 14 days for any reason other than work purposes in another province?
- Have you had close contact with anyone from outside of Atlantic Canada in the past 14 days?
- Have you been told by a public health official that you may have been exposed to Covid-19

3. You will need to wear a mask throughout the Mass unless for health reasons you can not wear a mask or you are under 2 years of age.

4. You will be asked to sanitize your hands on entering and exiting the church.

5. You will be seated in orderly fashion from front to back.

6. Holy Communion will be distributed at the end of the Mass as you leave. Holy Communion will be distributed on the hand only.

2020-2021 Pastoral Year Letter – “Towards a
Renewed Personal Encounter with Jesus”
A Call to the Clergy and Lay Faithful of the
Diocese of Saint John

September marks the beginning of a new pastoral year. The last few years have presented significant challenges for our Diocese, including the difficult amalgamation process for a number of our parishes and the pandemic. Yet despite these challenges Jesus never leaves us orphans. The Holy Spirit is on the move, and this gives us reason to hope. St. Paul reassures us, “Hope does not disappoint us, because God’s love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us” (Romans 5:5).

As we continue to face the uncertainties of our time, I am calling on all of the faithful to focus on the mission of evangelization and the renewal of our Diocese. This begins when people encounter Jesus Christ and are transformed. Christ, who promised us that he would be with us “always, to the end of the age” (Matthew 28:20), is present to us in so many ways. Paragraph 1373 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, “Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised from the dead, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us,” is present in many ways to his Church: in his word, in his Church’s prayer, “where two or three are gathered in my name,” in the poor, the sick, and the imprisoned, in the sacraments of which he is the author, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in the person of the minister. But “he is present ... most especially in the Eucharistic species.” The sacraments are the privileged ways, the most powerful ways that God shares his divine life with us and enables us to grow in our friendship with him. We encounter Jesus especially in the Eucharist, and in prayer, particularly before the Blessed Sacrament.

Pope Francis tells us that, “the Christian life needs to be nourished by attentive listening to God’s word and, above all, by the cultivation of a personal relationship with the Lord in Eucharistic adoration, the privileged “place” for our encounter with God.” (*Message for the 54th World Day of Prayer for Vocations 2017*). What a grace it is to spend such intimate time with our Lord! I have encouraged our pastors to offer times of

Eucharistic adoration in their parishes, and am asking the faithful to take advantage of these times so that we can grow deeper in our personal relationship with Jesus. Let us devote some of the time spent in adoration to pray not only for renewal in our Diocese and parishes, but also for much needed vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

So as to afford people more opportunities to encounter Christ, I am also asking parishes to offer one tool of evangelization beginning this fall. Some excellent programs include Alpha (which means “beginning”, and is a program covering the basics of Christianity designed to reach the unchurched), Catholic Christian Outreach (CCO) faith studies, or the ChristLife Evangelization Process. It is my hope that many will participate in courses like these in order to rekindle the fire in our hearts and ignite the desire to know Christ and share him with others.

When we experience a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ who gives meaning to our lives, and our hearts are on fire for Jesus, we cannot help but want to fulfill our God-given mission from baptism to be the missionary disciples that we are called to become. We are compelled to reach into the community and serve in various areas of need as apostles of mercy. As the Holy Father tells us, “When evangelizers rise from prayer, their hearts are more open; freed of self-absorption, they are desirous of doing good and sharing their lives with others.” (*Evangelii Gaudium*, par. 282). I encourage you to find out which outreach programs your parish supports, and seek out opportunities to serve in your community. It is also through such acts of charity that we encounter the Lord.

Please be assured of my ongoing pastoral solicitude and prayers, as we unite ourselves to the mission of evangelization and renewal. Let us give God permission to move in power in our Diocese, staying close to him in the Word and sacraments and in prayer. May we come alive in our faith, and proclaim him to a world in desperate need of the hope he promises.
